When the Olean Hunkies came to Dunkitk, they were confronted Ey a yet unlectshed caetial attack, an innovation which was a bia factor in Olean's stucumbing to Dunkirk 18-14. Playing in Fredonia's "Mudbowl" betare a crowd of 4,000 spectators, the Dunktric Gridders in the last game of the season handad the Hilltoppers an 18.0 Coss. In this tuaditional game both feams threw everything they had into the contest. By making a series of long gains through and around their rival's hecvy line, and by eating up yardage through the air, Dunkirk triumphantly marched on to victory.
