
Members of the Hi-Y have done their best to live up to the chief purpose of their organization: "to create, maintain, and extend throughout the home, school, and community high standards of Christian character."




Football



The Marauders brought joy to Dunkirk with their second win over Fredonia 51-43. They then closed out the regular season with 71-49 and 62-56 defeats at the hands of Tonawanda and Jamestown respectively.

This gave the Marauders a tie for third place in the Lake Share League with a 4 and 6 record in league play. The team then traveled to Buffalo's Memorial Auditorium where they again suffered defeat at the hands of Tonawanda 84.45 in the Section VI playoffs. Thus, the Marauders finished a rather disappointing season with a 4 and 14 record.


