

Dunkirk 20, Falconer 40




### Basketball

Dunkirk's Maroon Marauders opened their season on the road with a league game against Cassadaga Valley's Cougars dropping a 57-44 decision. Dunkirk's first win came at the expense of independent Silver Creek with a final tally of 60 to 29. The Dunkirk Marauders moved back into league play with a 56-42 victory over the Jamestown five. Playing a game which had been postponed earlier in the season, the Maroon dropped a close decision to the visiting Tonawandans with a score of 66 to 63. The Dunkirk five went on the road to hand the Trojans of Southwestern a 61-44 defeat. The Marauders played at home and walloped the Gowanda Panthers 68 to 43 to increase their league record to 3 wins and one loss before going on the road in an independent encounter with Mindszenty. Here the Maroon lost a heartbreaker with a final score of 60-58. Dunkirk moved their league record to 5 and 1 with victories in Fredonia and Falconer by successive scores of 42-25 and 64-60.

The Marauders went independent once more to avenge their earlier defeat to Mindszenty by squeezing out a 71-67 win. The "Fabulous Five" defeated Silver Creek for the second time with a score of 65 to 51.



to the 1956 spring season.




Each year Mrs. Hegmann makes this announcement to the senior girls in her gym classes.
