

Peace is not the absence of war; nor is it the absence of problems or strife or discord. Peace is understanding, compassion, and assistance.


When America extends her richness and power, her freedom, her human and natural resources, to aid other nations, she is making an investment in peace.

Every American graduate can pledge his particular responsibility in this investment, "Let there be peace on earth and let it begin with me."







The seniors of Dunkirk High will enter many different fields of endeavor, including education, government, journalism, and social service.

Some may enlist in the dynamic, new movements, such as the Peace Corps, an example of the good will and energy to be found in the grass roots of America.






HOOP NOTES






