


"MAKING THE PIECES FIT"



Duane's hobbies included playing basketball and lifting weights. He was more well-known, however, for his motorcycle. He also works part-time at the Galley restaurant.


Duane plans to attend the Air Force Academy, where he will major in Aeronautical Engineering and become a pilot or astronaut.

When asked about most memorable moments at D.H.S., Tim recalled the day he was leaving the high school after football, and somehow the pillar in front of the school landed on top of his car.






Upon graduation, Sean plans to attend the University of Syracuse to





#### Girls' Swim Team Has Disappointing Season


Although the "Swimmin Women" finished with a 2-9 season record, the team put forth a lot of effort this year, led by coach Kathy Findley.

Most of the season was spent on the road, and holds many memories for the team. Not to be forgotten are the "live" concerts, bus 29, or the B-52's and U2.








The Marauders began their season by





The girls' team was a very exciting one, and these players will be missed, as next year seems to indicate a rebuilding year after their graduation.











Dunkirk's six losses included a couple of close contests, one against Salamanca (27-28) and another to Frewsburg (18-29)





### Maroon Wave Pulls Out All Stops




Cheese and sausage forms filled the halls and street of Dunkirk as eager chorus members hurried about making sales to earn money for this year's trip.

# Sophomores: Class of '86 Shows Growth


The Class of 1986 continued school life with enthusiasm as they entered their sophomore year.
